Long, long ago, Armenians were trying hard to live in ways pleasing to God. But they had a big problem! It was the year 451 A.D., and the fire-worshipping Persians and the Christian Armenians were about to fight a religious war. Why?

The Persian king ordered all the Christians under his rule to give up their religion and worship the sun and fire. Ghevont Yerets, a priest, called a special meeting. He invited Vartan because he needed his help to get the Persians out of Armenia. A letter was sent to the Persian king.

Our Armenian Way

The Persian king sent an army of about 220,000 soldiers to Armenia to make the people change their minds about being Christian. The Persian army even had elephants.

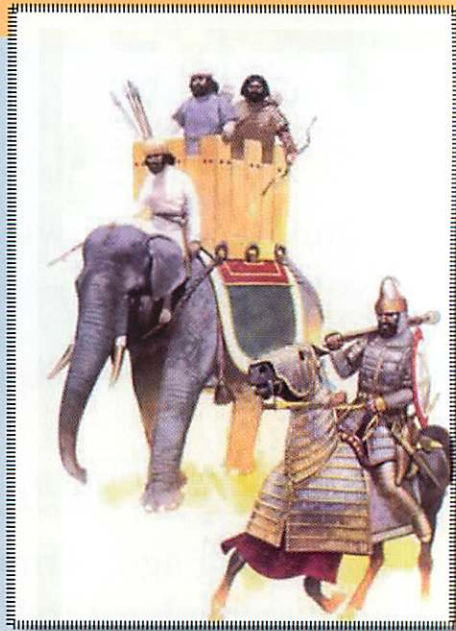
The day before the battle, the Armenian soldiers spent the night in prayer. Leading them were Catholicos Hovsep, Ghevont and General Vartan Mamigonian. At dawn, the soldiers received Holy Communion.

The band of Armenian fighters, 66,000 of them, stood on the field of Avarayr near Mt. Ararat with their leader General Vartan.

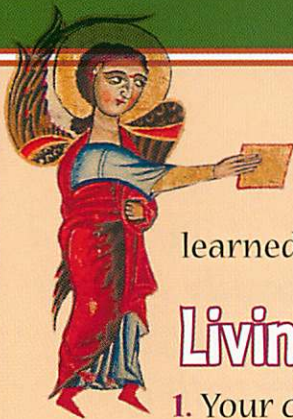
He led the men across as he rode on his white horse. At one point, he found himself surrounded by a circle of elephants. An arrow struck him, and he died. The battle lasted only one day and there were great losses on both sides. Still the Armenians did not give up their Christian faith.

They continued their fighting for thirty years. Then, Vartan's nephew, Vahan Mamigonian made a treaty with the Persians which granted the Armenians full religious freedom.
